

MESSAGE FROM THE MAYOR

You might be wondering.....

What happened to the flag at the Square? Last December, as Constitution Square was being decorated for Christmas, it became apparent that the electrical system was in bad shape. So bad, that after the holidays were past, the decision was made to turn the electric off until weather permitted permanent repairs to be made. Without electricity, the light illuminating the flag at night was inoperable. As a result, the flag would have needed to have been raised and lowered daily or taken down until the electrical repairs could be made. With winter weather now behind us, you will soon see the repairs being made and the flag will return.

At their May meeting, Borough Council awarded a contract for the completion of the Locust Street project. The contract calls for the installation of an additional storm sewer inlet at the intersection of Locust and North Second Streets, milling and re-shaping of the street and final paving. The remaining detail will be to plant new trees. Hopefully, with the completion of this project, the problem of parked cars falling into collapsing storm sewer pipes will be behind us.

The beginning of this year saw a number of blighted properties start the path back to useful service. Of course we are still eagerly waiting for several other properties to do the same. The Borough's property maintenance code does address these messes. However, absent an owner (often due to foreclosure) the only thing to do is wait for ownership to be resolved. In other situations, the property owner is unwilling to address violations. When that is the case, a citation is then filed with District Court and thus begins a time consuming and sometimes lengthy process. Despite the difficulties and complexities of all of this, a good amount of progress is being made. The reality is that the problems of today will eventually be corrected only to be replaced by new ones. The realistic long term goal is to reduce the number and severity of the problems. This will occur with a disciplined and consistent approach to the enforcement of the property maintenance ordinance.

Staffing of the Borough's Police Department is now enabling us to provide continuous coverage on a consistent basis. This has also allowed a significant number of operational improvements to be made within the department. Officers from Wrightsville, Lower Windsor and Hellam are routinely communicating and providing support to each other. It is becoming apparent that the Eastern York area is benefitting from having adequate police resources overall as we are able to effectively address a wide variety of law enforcement challenges as they arise.

Soon, if not already, you will notice some interesting activity along the river adjacent to the Borough offices and waste water facility. The Borough Municipal Authority has received funding from PADEP to assess the environmental needs of the former Electroplaters site. This project will involve some exploratory earth moving and the drilling of new test wells. After the ground is probed and the water underground is accessed, testing will occur to determine what, if any, corrective measures will be needed. The results of this will be available to the public. Public interest is not only welcome but encouraged.

Wrightsville continues to be a very busy place! I hope you have a safe and enjoyable summer.





PERMITS

Permit applications and other useful forms are located in the Borough lobby and also on the Borough website: www.wrightsvilleborough.com. Permit fees do not need to be paid until permit is approved and picked up.

PARK PAVILION RESERVATION:

- FREE
- Include # of tables needed when submitting reservation
- Borough Streets Department will set up tables prior to event

YARD SALE PERMIT:

- FREE for first 3 in a calendar year (\$25 each after that)
- Apply for permit 1 week before yard sale to be sure there is plenty of time
- Permit must be on hand during yard sale (No need to display it)

SOLICITATION (Transient Business Permit):

- \$50 Fee (Good for 1 month)
- All 10 checklist items must be included on permit application
- Permit approval does not happen the same day

ENTERTAINMENT PERMIT:

- \$50 Fee
- Will you require any street closures? Be sure to submit a street closure request with your permit application.
- Borough Mayor and Secretary will need to approve



ZONING & BUILDING PERMITS

All zoning and building (UCC) permit paperwork will now be handled at the Borough Office. Payment for both will also be collected at the Borough. If your project requires both a zoning and a UCC permit, you will need to pay for your permits with 2 separate checks or money orders.

It is unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to erect, construct, enlarge, alter, move, improve, remove, convert or demolish any building/structure without a permit.

Permits are very beneficial to you and our community. By working with the Borough, you will benefit from their knowledge of building codes to ensure your construction project is built right, will be safe, and will last.

EFFECTIVE STORMWATER MANAGEMENT

10 EASY ENVIRONMENTALLY HEALTHY TIPS:

1. Avoid overwatering your garden.
2. Remember to ALWAYS pick up your pet's waste and dispose of it properly. The fish don't want to swim in puppy poo anymore than we do.
3. If you want your car to sparkle, take it to a commercial car wash.
4. Keep your grass clippings off the driveway, sidewalk and street.
5. When mixing/preparing pesticides, be sure to stay a good distance away from any storm drains.
6. Clean up vehicle spills and leaks with kitty litter, sand or sawdust – Never wash away with water.
7. Check the weather forecast before using fertilizer or pesticides – Never use if rain is on the way.
8. Keep piles of dirt or mulch away from storm drains.
9. Never put trash in a can without a lid.
10. Recycle used oil, batteries and antifreeze.

ADOPT-A-STORM DRAIN

It is very important that we work together to keep our storm drains working at 100% capacity at all times. Leaves, grass clippings, trash, branches, etc. can cause blockage which may result in dangerous street flooding if a storm hits.

Please report any damaged or blocked storm drain inlets right away by calling the Streets Department at 252-4559.

STORMWATER MANAGEMENT TERMS & DEFINITIONS

Best Management Practices (BMPs): A technique, process, activity, or structure used to reduce the pollutant content of a stormwater discharge.

Clean Water Act: The primary federal law in the United States governing water pollution.

Discharge: The action of allowing a liquid, gas, or other substance to flow out from where it has been confined.

Erosion: The process by which the surface of the earth is worn away by the action of water, glaciers, winds, waves, etc.

Illicit Discharge: Any discharge to a municipal storm sewer that is not composed entirely of stormwater.

Impervious Surface: A surface composed of any material which impedes or prevents the natural infiltration of water into the soil.

National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES): Permitting mechanism to require the implementation of controls designed to prevent harmful pollutants from being washed by stormwater runoff into local water bodies.

Natural Filter: A grassed, wooded or vegetative strip that acts as a filter for runoff before water enters a body of water.

Pathogens: An agent that causes infection or disease.

Runoff: The water flow that occurs when the precipitation rate exceeds the infiltration rate flows over the land

Storm Drain System: A vast network of underground pipes and open channels designed for flood control.

Storm Drain: An opening leading to an underground pipe or open ditch for carrying surface runoff – separate from the sanitary sewer or wastewater system.

Stormwater: Surface water in abnormal quantity resulting from heavy falls of rain or snow.

Water Quality: The physical, chemical and biological characteristics of water.

Watershed: Geographical area that drains to a specified point on a water course – also known as drainage area, catchment or river basin.

DO YOU HAVE AN UNUSUALLY HIGH WATER BILL?

You may be unaware of a leaking faucet or running toilet. To check for a possible leak, turn off everything in your home and then go out and watch your water meter. Your meter will only move if water is flowing through it. If your meter is moving, it means you have a leak somewhere in your home. Be sure to get the leak fixed as quickly as possible to keep your bill from getting too high.

PUBLIC SAFETY

Let's all work together to keep our beautiful town safe.

FIRE

Know the Facts...

Air Conditioners

- 🚒 A leaking A/C unit can short-circuit electrical equipment.
- 🚒 An estimated 60 injuries and 5 deaths are caused each year by residential air conditioners malfunctioning.

Barbecuing

- 🚒 Adding lighter fluid to an already lit fire could cause the flame to flashback up into the container and explode.
- 🚒 Approximately 5,700 grill fires start each year, causing 100 injuries and 10 deaths.

Fireworks

Keep yourself and your children safe this Fourth of July!

- 🚒 In 2011, 9,600 firework injuries were treated in U.S. hospital emergency departments.
- 🚒 A rocket can reach speeds of 150mph.
- 🚒 On average, every day during the month around the July 4th holiday, 200 people will visit the emergency room with a firework injury.
- 🚒 **Sparklers are HOT! They can reach 1,800°F – hot enough to melt gold!**

POLICE

Safety tips for our walkers, runner and bicyclists; all of whom have to share our narrow roads and streets with motor vehicles:

- 🚒 Pretend you're invisible. Sounds sort of funny but it's a good way to keep from getting run over. Make it irrelevant whether drivers see you or not. If you always assume a driver doesn't see you, you'll be a lot safer.
- 🚒 Wear reflective clothing. Take a look at the next police officer you on traffic duty. They're wearing reflective colors... if you're going to be in the roadway, you should too.
- 🚒 Never run or walk more than two-abreast and make sure you face traffic, keeping as close to the side of the road as possible in case you have to take evasive action. Bikers should travel with traffic and obey the rules of the road while always wearing a helmet.
- 🚒 Be attentive to lighting conditions. It's harder for drivers to see during dusk and dawn. Remember that solar glare is a factor in a lot of accidents.
- 🚒 Finally, drivers should keep their windshields clean. It's also an excellent idea to wash off your headlights and taillights when you gas up. It makes a big difference.

REMINDERS

- 🚒 Always look twice for motorcycles.
- 🚒 Keep a cell phone with you. It's good to program the word "ICE" in your cell phone contact list. ICE stands for: In Case of Emergency. Just enter your emergency contact person (mom, dad, husband, wife, brother, sister, etc) under the name, ICE so police, fire or EMS personnel will have a point of contact in case you're involved in an accident.
- 🚒 Don't forget to lock your vehicles at night.
