LEASHING YOUR ANIMALS

In accordance with Ordinance 2011-1; Section 3; #13, it is not permissible to allow pets to run at large without being on a leash pursuant to P.S.3 459-305.

When walking your animal in the Borough, please keep in mind that it is required by law to keep your dog leashed. Additionally, there are numerous potentially detrimental situations that can occur with an animal walking around without a leash.

2. Loose animals have more potential to be involved in fighting with other animals.
3. Leashed animals rarely get hit by vehicles.
4. Loose animals can possibly injure people in the vicinity.

PennDot Yellow Dot Program

Pennsylvania's Yellow Dot Program was created to assist citizens in the "golden hour" of emergency care following a traffic accident when they may not be able to communicate their needs themselves. Placing a yellow dot in your vehicle's rear window alerts first responders to check your glove compartment for vital information to ensure you receive the medical attention you need.

The program is a cooperative effort among the Pennsylvania Departments of Transportation, Health and Aging; the Pennsylvania State Police, the Pennsylvania Turnpike Commission and First Responders and local law enforcement. Participants complete a personal information form, which includes the participant's name, contact information, emergency contact information, medical history and medications, allergies and the participant's doctors' names.

A photo – showing only the participant's head and shoulders – is then taped to the front of the completed information sheet. The yellow dot decal provided in the program kit is placed in the lower left corner of the participant's vehicle's rear windshield. The decal should be no higher than 3 inches from the bottom of the windshield.

What is Stormwater Runoff?

Stormwater runoff occurs when precipitation from rain or snowmelt flows over the ground. Impervious surfaces like driveways, sidewalks, and streets prevent stormwater runoff

from naturally soaking into the ground.

Why is stormwater runoff a problem?

Stormwater can pick up debris, chemicals, dirt, and other pollutants and flow into a storm sewer system or directly to a lake, stream, river,

wetland, or coastal water. Anything that enters a storm sewer system is discharged untreated into the waterbodies we use for swimming, fishing and providing drinking water.

10 EASY Environmentally Healthy Stormwater Tips

1. Clean up any vehicle spills or leaks with cat litter, sawdust or sand— NEVER wash it away with water.
2. Do not put trash in a can without a lid.
3. Recycle used oil, antifreeze and batteries.
4. Before using pesticides or fertilizers, check the weather forecast— never use these if rain is on the way.
5. Avoid overwatering your lawn.
6. ALWAYS pick up waste from your pet and dispose of it properly.
7. Keep your grass clippings off of the street, sidewalk and driveway.
8. When preparing pesticides, be sure to remain a good distance away from any storm drains.
9. Keep piles of mulch or dirt away from nearby storm drains.
10. Wash your vehicle in a commercial car wash.

STORM DRAINS

It is extremely important that we work together to keep our storm drains operating at 100% capacity at all times.

Leaves, branches, grass clippings and trash are just some of the things that can block the storm drains. Blockage of the drains may result in dangerous flooding of the streets if a storm hits.

IS IT A DISPUTE, A VIOLATION OR A CIVIL MATTER?

Most disputes between two parties are civil matters and should be addressed via the District Magistrate's office.

Please take note that the Borough may not be able to assist you in civil matters.

If you have concerns about a possible Ordinance violation, obtain and complete a Borough complaint form. Residential Complaint Forms are available online www.wrightsvilleborough.com or in the lobby of the municipal administrative building located at 601 Water Street.

SAFETY WHEN GRILLING

- Clean the grill and drip trays regularly to prevent any grease or flash fires that could occur from fat build up.
- Children and pets should be kept away from grills at all times when in use.
- Charcoal and propane grills should never be used in a home or any confined space.
- Check propane grill hoses regularly using a soap mix in a spray bottle can quickly detect any leaks on a hose.
- Light grills a good distance away from any structure or flammable materials. Vinyl siding can quickly melt or ignite if a grill is used too closely.

River Safety

While the Susquehanna River offers many recreational activities during the Spring and Summer season, underestimating it's power can prove to be fatal.

Some safety tips to keep in mind when enjoying the river...

- ◆ When boating, canoeing or kayaking, be sure that you inform someone on shore when you set out and expect to return.
- ◆ Go out with others. Never go alone. While on the river, always have someone with you at all times.
- ◆ Wear Coast Guard approved personal flotation devices whenever on the river.
- ◆ Unfortunately, many things wash down the river, such as glass and other dangerous debris. Wear protective footwear.
- ◆ Refrain from swimming in the river. Powerful currents can pull even the strongest of swimmers under the water without warning.

Yard Sale Permits

- *The first three yard sales per year are free.
- *\$25 per yard sale beginning with the fourth yard sale of the year.
- *Each day of a yard sale constitutes one yard sale. For example, having a yard sale on two consecutive days equates to two yard sales.
- *You MAY NOT post yard sale signs on utility poles or sign posts within the Borough of Wrightsville.

Zoning & Building Permits

Thinking of a new home project? The best thing to do when considering a new home improvement project, is to check to see if a permit is needed.

Permitting information is available online at www.wrightsvilleborough.com. You can also visit the Zoning Officer on Monday evenings, 5 p.m.—6:30 p.m. at the Borough office located at 601 Water Street. Emailing the Zoning officer at zoning@wrightsvilleborough.com is also a convenient option in which to ask question regarding the project you are planning.

Building permits and Zoning permits are two separate types of permits. Some projects require the obtainment of both permits, while other may only require one or the other. Zoning permits will typically determine the WHERE you can build something while UCC (building) permits determine the HOW.

Permits are required for your safety as well as the safety of the properties around you.

All permitting paperwork is performed through the Borough office. Payment for all permits must be in the form of a check or money order. For UCC (building) permits, the check or money order should be made out to “Code Administrators, Inc” and all Zoning permit payments should be made out to “Wrightsville Borough”. If your project requires two permits from both entities, payment needs to be in the form of two separate checks or money orders.

DIFFERENT PERMITS REQUIRE CONTACT WITH DIFFERENT INDIVIDUALS. SO, WHO DO YOU NEED TO SPEAK WITH?

- ◇ All things Zoning should be discussed with Sande Cunningham, Zoning Officer for the Borough of Wrightsville. Sande has office hours on Mondays, from 5:00 p.m. to 6:00 p.m. Additionally, Sande can be reached via 717-252-2768 extension 14; however, the best way to reach Sande is to email her at zoning@wrightsvilleborough.com
- ◇ We utilize Code Administrators, Inc to handle all aspects of the UCC (Uniform Construction Code). If you have a building permit question, give Code Administrators a call at 717-755-9120 or stop in at their office located at 116 Hellam Street, conveniently located in Wrightsville!


Fold in all of the Cool Whip. Layer into bucket in this order: sand, pudding, sand, pudding, sand

ECRIN

ECRIN (Evacuating County Residents In Need) is a free, voluntary, community outreach service to assist elected officials and emergency responders in municipalities across York County in obtaining important information on special needs residents living in their communities.

ECRIN also assists residents by ensuring that all emergency response units (fire, police, EMA, etc) have access to the same information about each person — thus decreasing confusion during an emergency situation. This standardized information decreases safety risks to both responders and residents in emergency situations. The system is entirely voluntary — elected officials in each municipality determine whether they want to participate, and residents signing up for the service must also sign a form. Under state law, municipalities are required to keep information on special needs persons in their area, and ECRIN provides an organized system to do so.

ECRIN can be used for more than just evacuation purposes — the information it provides is also helpful in any emergency situation (fire, chemical spill, police incident, etc).

TREES, GRASS AND WEEDS

WB-IPMC-Chapter 3, Section 302.4

All premises and exterior property shall be maintained free from excessive weed or plant growth. Weeds are defined as all grasses, annual plants and vegetation, other than trees or shrubs provided; however, this term shall not include cultivated flowers and gardens.

STREET LIGHTS/SIGNS

If you see a street light problem/outage or a damaged street sign, please contact the Streets Department at 252-4559. The closest street address will be needed when reporting the problem. Street lights should be referenced by their pole number.


Mayor's Corner
