



What is Zoning? Why do we need it?

During the Summer/Fall of 2013, the Borough of Wrightsville will be implementing a Zoning Ordinance. This Ordinance designates land uses in the municipality (Commercial, Residential, Industrial, Open Space or Town Center, etc). Communities benefit from Zoning by the establishment of design standards for different areas within the Borough in order to preserve the “character” of the community. Zoning assists in the following:

- Conservation and stabilization of property values
- Prevention of an excessive concentration of population
- Encouragement of the most suitable use of land
- Promotion of safety, public health and general welfare of the residents

**Message from Penn State Extension-York County
West Nile Virus Program:**

In 2012, York County had the highest number of trap samples test positive in Pennsylvania for the detection of West Nile Virus in mosquito populations. York County also ranked third in the nation for detection of West Nile Virus. The most common sources of high mosquito populations in urban areas continue to be from trash and yard clutter. Residents, businesses and municipalities can greatly reduce mosquito concerns and health risk by cleaning up their own property and local community. Traps will be routinely placed throughout York County from April through October to monitor mosquito populations. IMPORTANT BOROUGH INFORMATION

ANIMAL CONTROL

In accordance with Chapter 6, Part 3, §307 of the Code of Ordinances, remember to always clean up after your dog to avoid creating an animal nuisance.

Additionally, Chapter 2, Part 1, §102 states that allowing your cat to run at large within the Borough is prohibited. Any resident that wishes to have a stray or wild animal removed from the Borough may borrow a trap from the Borough Office for personal use or contact Hemler Animal Control Services at (717)235-6213. The fee for Hemler's services is the responsibility of the caller.

ELECTRONICS RECYCLING

Pennsylvania's "Covered Device Recycling Act" (Act 108) prohibits the acceptance of "covered devices" including televisions, desktop & laptop computers, computer monitors and computer peripherals at all Pennsylvania solid waste disposal facilities and also *prohibits residents from placing them at the curb for waste pick-up*. See the Recycling section for a list of electronic drop-off sites.

NOISE

Any loud and unnecessary noise created between the hours of 11PM and 7AM is prohibited within the Borough pursuant to Chapter 10, Part 2, §201 of the Code of Ordinances.

PA ONE CALL SYSTEM

Before planning any activity that involves digging, property owners must call PA ONE CALL at 811. Visit www.pa1call.org for more information.

POOLS

Don't let the name *temporary pool* fool you. If your pool is able to contain water over 24 inches deep, you will need a permit before installation. This includes swimming pools, hot tubs, spas and wading pools.

SOLID WASTE

Refuse containers are to be placed at the curb no earlier than the day before collection and must be removed by the end of the day of collection. Refuse containers must be leak-proof, insect/rodent-proof and equipped with tight-fitting lids.

STREET LIGHTS/SIGNS

If you see a street light problem/outage or a damaged street sign, please contact the Streets Department at 252-4559. The closest street address will be needed when reporting the problem. Street lights should be referenced by their pole number if possible.

TREES, GRASS AND WEEDS

WB-IPMC-Chapter 3, Section 302.4

All premises and exterior property shall be maintained free from excessive weed or plant growth. Weeds are defined as all grasses, annual plants and vegetation, other than trees or shrubs provided; however, this term shall not include cultivated flowers and gardens.

YARD SALE

Borough residents are required to apply for a permit before having a yard sale pursuant to Chapter 13, Part 2, §202-H. The first 3 yard sales a resident has are FREE. Any additional yard sales held within the same calendar year will be issued with a \$25 fee.

YARD WASTE

Yard waste pick-up day is MONDAY. Large branches must be broken down and bundled. All other yard waste may be placed in a bin or biodegradable bags. Yard waste bags can be purchased at the Borough office or Sue's Market for \$0.46/each.

MESSAGE FROM THE MAYOR

Just a quick update on some changes you may not have been aware of or might have questions about...

- Approximately a year ago, the Borough began utilizing ambulance service provided by White Rose Ambulance. This is a five year, no cost, joint venture between Wrightsville Borough, Hallam Borough, Hellam Township and White Rose Ambulance. White Rose has dedicated an ambulance with around the clock staff exclusively for our area. They are based in the Hellam Township Municipal Building located between Wrightsville and Hallam.
- Last year, Fred Smeltzer switched hats from Wrightsville Fire Chief 41 to Hellam Township Fire Chief 40. This may initially be perplexing, as the Township is equally served by the fire departments in Wrightsville and Hallam. What this means is that Fred will be in charge of all emergency incidents within Hellam Township. Fred can still routinely be found at his second home, the Wrightsville Firehouse. The position of Wrightsville Chief 41 is now in the capable hands of Chad Livelsberger. Station 41 has been very busy recently after obtaining several grants for the purposes of upgrading equipment, facilities and staffing. If you were to stop by the firehouse, I am sure they would be happy to explain.
- The Wrightsville Police Department is now under the guidance and leadership of Chief Ron Hege. Chief Hege came to Wrightsville after a 21 year career with the Baltimore City Police Department. Over the past six months, Chief Hege has been busy making improvements in the areas of equipment, training, policy, procedures and coverage. This is an ongoing effort that is starting to show terrific results.
- Wrightsville, Hallam, Hellam Township and Lower Windsor Township are actively pursuing an inter-municipal agreement that will combine our Emergency Management Plans as well as our efforts during times of crisis.
- Code Administrators, Inc., (Wrightsville's code enforcement provider) has recently re-located their York County office to 116 Hellam Street, Wrightsville. Their office has also undergone changes in staffing to include: Annette Stevens as the Office Manager and Kayla Valldes as the Administrative Assistant.
- Borough Council recently appointed Sande Cunningham to the part time position of Borough Zoning Officer. Sande will have the task of administering the Borough's Zoning Ordinance. Sande is also currently the Zoning Officer for Lower Windsor Township and East Prospect Borough.

As you can see, Wrightsville is a busy and productive place. I am happy to report in spite of all of the changes, things are running smoothly and are in the hands of very capable people. I'd encourage everyone, that when presented with an opportunity to talk with the individuals mentioned above, take the time to talk with them and learn about what they do for our Borough.

PERMITS

Do I need a permit?

It is unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to erect, construct, enlarge, alter, move, improve, remove, convert or demolish any building/structure without a municipal permit.

Why do I need a permit?

By obtaining a municipal permit, you will protect the outcome and investment value of your construction project and be able to guard against a lawsuit or injury. Building permits are very beneficial to you and our community. By working with the Borough, you will benefit from their knowledge of building codes to ensure your construction project is built right, will be safe, and will last.



PROOF OF INSURANCE

Proof of insurance is required on all projects in the form of a **Certificate of Liability** listing **Wrightsville Borough** as the **certificate holder**. If a contractor is doing the work, their liability insurance information is required. If a contractor is not employed, the homeowner must provide a copy of their homeowners insurance in the form as a certificate of liability. This is typically called an ACORD file.

What is a Certificate of Liability?

A Certificate of Liability verifies to the Certificate Holder what insurance policy and coverage is in place at the time the certificate is issued. Therefore, a certificate is provided as evidence of insurance and to assure capability of providing the required financial protection in the event of a loss.

***** IMPORTANT *****

If your construction project falls under the Uniform Construction Code requirements, you will need to obtain a permit from the Borough office **AND** a permit from Code Administrators located at: 116 Hellam St. Suite 1, Wrightsville, PA 17368. Please call the Borough office at 717-252-2768 ext 12 or ext 13 to obtain information regarding permitting requirements.

OPEN BURNING

In accordance with Chapter 7, Part 1, §102 of the Code of Ordinances:

Within the Borough limits, no person shall:

- A. Ignite or feed an open fire in any public or private place outside any building.
- B. Cause, suffer, allow or permit the maintenance of any open fire on any property under his control outside of any building.

DOOR TO DOOR SOLICITATION

In accordance with Chapter 13, Part 2, §201/§202, anyone that wishes to solicit door to door must first obtain a transient business permit from the Borough.

EFFECTIVE STORMWATER MANAGEMENT

TIPS TO HELP KEEP OUR WATERWAYS CLEAN AND HEALTHY:

- Do not dump anything down storm sewers!
- Use kitty litter or sand to clean up spilled vehicle fluids.
- Do not hose down yard debris. Sweep it up and throw it into a trash receptacle instead.
- Wash your car in the grass or at a car wash.
- Consider using permeable paving such as gravel and interlocking pavers.
- Prevent soil erosion by vegetating bare spots in your yard.
- Pick up pet waste immediately and dispose of it properly.
- Before draining your swimming pool, use a test kit to ensure the water is free of chlorine.
- Rather than using harmful store-bought fertilizers, try this safe and beneficial Compost Tea Fertilizer recipe instead:
 1. Mix a small amount of compost in the bottom of a bucket and fill with water.
 2. Stirring occasionally, let the mixture sit for several days.
 3. Use as plant food.

What is Stormwater Runoff?

Stormwater runoff is the mixture of rain water and pollution that is picked up as the rain water runs off of impervious surfaces such as buildings, parking lots, driveways and roads. This polluted rain water then drains into storm sewers which lead to major waterways such as rivers, lakes, seas and oceans. This pollution can be hazardous to plants, animals, fish and people.

If you decide to embark upon a do-it-yourself project rather than hire a contractor, take the time to educate yourself on the type of permit(s) that may be required. Residents and business owners should use Best Management Practices (BMP'S) to prevent or treat the water that flows from your property and into the Borough storm drains.

ADOPT-A-STORM DRAIN

It is very important that we work together to keep our storm drains working at 100% capacity at all times. Leaves, grass clippings, trash, branches, etc. can cause blockage which may result in dangerous street flooding if a storm hits.

PUBLIC SAFETY TIPS

Summertime is the time of camping, backyard grilling, vacations and the Fourth of July.

Please read the following safety tips to ensure you have a safe and fun summer!

Fireworks Safety - The best way to keep your family from harm is to refrain from using fireworks in your home. Do not allow children to play with fireworks.

Grilling Safety - Good safety practices include:

- Before using a propane grill, check the connection between the tank and the fuel line. Make sure the tubes where the air and gas mix, are not blocked. Check hoses for cracks and damage.
- Keep a fire extinguisher or a source of water nearby.
- Do not overfill the propane tank.
- Do not wear loose clothing.
- Do not squirt flammable liquids onto an open flame because the flame may flash back up into the container and explode.
- Keep all matches and lighters away from children. Supervise children around outdoor grills.
- Dispose of hot coals properly by dousing them with plenty of water, then stirring them to ensure that the fire is extinguished. Never place them in plastic, paper or wooden containers.
- Never grill/barbecue in enclosed areas - carbon monoxide could be produced.
- Do not leave the grill unattended.
- Make sure everyone knows to Stop, Drop and Roll in case a piece of clothing does catch fire. Call 911 or your local emergency number if a burn warrants serious medical attention.

Home Safety - A lot of people vacation during the summer months. Here are a few suggestions to keep your home safe while out of town:

- Arrange with a friend or neighbor to have your mail picked up so it does not pile up, indicating that nobody is home. Another option is to call the Post Office and request your mail to be held until you return.
- Stop newspaper delivery while you are on vacation.
- Close and lock all windows (particularly ground floor windows).
- Ask a friend or hire someone to maintain the landscaping on your property.
- Do not announce on media outlets such as Facebook and blogs that you will be out of town.

Vehicle Safety - Thefts from autos are a crime of opportunity that can be prevented. Typically, thieves will not bother to break into an auto if valuables are not left out in plain sight. Some easy tips to avoid auto theft include:

- Remove the faceplate on your radio - If you are able to unfasten the faceplate on your stereo, and take it with you, please do so. Keep your CD's, mp3 players and other electronic devices in the glove department or console and *out of sight*.
- Shopping bags are tempting - Do not lure thieves by leaving newly purchased items in shopping bags visible to passersby.
- Your trunk is a good tool to hide valuables.
- Lock your car - When you are not in the car, keep it locked *at all times*.
- Mount your GPS - If you are not able to securely and permanently mount your GPS system, then take it with you or hide it in the console, trunk or glove department.

IMPORTANT NOTIFICATIONS

There will be street maintenance/reconstruction on Locust Street this summer, which will affect traffic and parking. This project focuses on the 100 block and 200 block of Locust Street. Locust Street will be milled and overlaid with new asphalt paving from Front Street to Third Street in addition to the installation of a new storm sewer system.

Hydrant flushing will begin June 4 and end June 6. Hydrants will be flushed from 9:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. There may be a temporary drop in water pressure and the water may be rusty or cloudy for a few hours. Do not wash white laundry during this period. Wait until both cold and hot water are clear before laundering whites. If stains appear on laundered clothes, do not put the clothes in the dryer as this will set the stain.
